As the school year begins, there will be rules and routines that the students will be expected to follow. These rules help to provide a safe and supportive learning environment. It is important that you discuss these rules and routines with your child throughout the year.

Each month you will receive a monthly newsletter. The newsletter will provide important dates and reminders for special events. It will also provide information about our monthly theme and family engagement activities. These activities are to be done at home with your child to deepen learning and add further exploration of the theme we are exploring in the classroom. There will also be opportunities for family engagement events that tie into the curriculum and study units. Parents are invited and encouraged to participate in their child's UPK experience. Parents are given opportunities to volunteer for special projects, class activities, and field trips

We will provide your child with many stimulating experiences. Students will be encouraged to observe, explore, question, discover, build, deconstruct, create, write and draw. This type of active learning will help your child to develop socially, emotionally and cognitively.

YOUR CHILD WILL GET MESSY IN PRE-K!!!! We do many fun, filled learning activities with paints, bubbles, shaving cream, play-dough and lots more. Weather permitting, student's will also be taken on neighborhood walks. It is important for your child to participate in these activities, so PLEASE dress your child appropriately if he or she does not wish to wear the optional school uniform. Please send your child to school in sneakers (Velcro if possible) or full shoes. Please no flip flops, sandals, or backless shoes.

Your timeliness in dropping off and picking up your child from school is very important. School starts promptly at 8:00am and dismissal is at 2:20pm. Early morning drop- off and after care is provided through St. Anselm Catholic Academy for a nominal fee.

There are many toys and games that your children will be able to play with daily. We ask that the children leave their toys at home! <u>PLEASE</u> <u>DO NOT BRING TOYS TO SCHOOL</u>. There will be opportunities on sharing days for students to bring in things from home.

We will be sending home weekly emails in connection with Class Dojo to keep you updated and engaged on what your child has been exploring. Please read the weekly emails, they will have important reminders, dates and information.

Classroom Rules and Routines

Please review with your child throughout the year!

- 1. Walking Feet We do not run in the classroom.
- 2. Looking Eyes We pay attention to what we are doing, we use our eyes to look at the teacher.
- 3. Listening Ears When the teachers and friends are speaking, we listen and our mouths are quiet.
- 4. Soft Helping Hands No hitting, pushing, pulling or grabbing our friends.
- 5. Clean Up After we are done playing, we clean up our toys.
- 6. Wash Hands When do we wash our hands? After we play, after we sneeze or cough, before we eat, after we go to the bathroom! (Please practice proper hand washing at home!!!!!)
- 7. Practice bathroom routines at home.
- 8. Quiet Time This is a time to relax, some children will sleep, and others may not. Please remind children that this is not a time talking and moving around the classroom. We can sleep, sit or lay on the mat. We need to be respectful of our friends who may be sleeping.
- 9. Sharing is Caring It is important to share classroom toys and materials.
- 10. Use Your Words NOT Your Hands Please review with children how to use their words to express their needs.
- 11. If you are upset, tell the teacher.
- 12. Be Kind to Others!

Our preschool curriculum is aligned to early learning guidelines in each state and the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework, so you can demonstrate that the program is meeting all requirements while focusing on the needs of individual children.

Children learn by doing. They must have hands on, concrete objects to feel, to see, to smell and to hear, in order to grasp and develop concepts and understanding. Our teachers engage children in a variety of play-based, developmentally appropriate learning experiences. We use age-appropriate, research-based curricula to support children's learning across all areas of development. Our curriculum is divided into the following Learning Centers which can and do change over the course of the year as the children's interests change and as they progress along their learning journey:

1 Block Center

Block Center helps children learn to develop Problem-solving skills, Cooperation Skills, develop Fine & Gross motor skills, practice Math & Science skills, enhance their Language & Literacy abilities.

2. Socio-Dramatic Play Center

Play is the essence of creativity in all children. Socio-Dramatic Center helps children make sense of their own world; it helps children develop important complex social and higher order thinking skills. The dramatic play center will be changed each month in order to align with the unit of study.

3. Mathematics Center

Concrete experiences with blocks and various counting objects develop the meanings of number and number relationships. Math materials are diverse, ranging from counting the snack (pretzels, crackers, fruit pieces, carrots, napkins, cups), distributing blocks of different sizes, but equal amounts, crayons, paint brushes, beads, pencils, papers, art materials. The child begins to count by rote but many will begin to understand one-to-one correspondence.

4. Music/Rhythmic Movement

Research shows that the earlier music is introduced into a child's life, the better he or she develops academically, socially and physically and emotionally. During the first years of a child's life, musical skills build self-esteem and enhance expression.

5. Reading Center & 6. Writing Center

Research shows that successful readers see a relationship between spoken language and the written word. They are aware that sounds are how language is put together. Many books are accessible to the children. Each day includes a time for quiet books. Freedom of choice is exercised; children are encouraged to look at the pictures and retell the story to classmates or staff members. Teachers also take the time to read to children individually or in small groups. They learn about the characteristics of books such as title, author, and

illustrator. As books are read to the children, the children are encouraged to predict what might happen next, think about the characteristics (in terms of traits), answer simple questions, and identify the setting.

7. Art Center

The Art Center helps children to explore their creativity. Art helps to develop the right side of the brain. Art is a fundamental component of what makes us uniquely human. Children develop life skills through art activities: Communication Skills, Problem-Solving Skills, Social-Emotional Skills, Fine Motor Skills, and, Self-Expression & Creativity.

8. Science Center

Science builds our knowledge and understanding of the world, and allows us to create new technology and innovation and drive positive change and conservation. Science Center helps children learn to investigate the world around them. Science Center helps children develop vital life-skills such as problem-solving, communication and research. Science is one of the most important subjects a child can learn because of its relevance to our lives and its capacity to apply these vital life-skills to everyday activities. These skills help children to generate ideas, make decisions and to use evidence to understand key issues.

Physical Development

There are provisions for physical activity indoors and outdoors. Physical activities are noncompetitive. Our Pre-K program will allow for an abundance of opportunities to practice motor skills such as:

- Skipping and running
- Jumping on frog jumper/trampoline
- Playing catch with balls / Shooting hoops
- Hopscotch
- Climbing, crawling and sliding on our playground playset
- Balancing on beams/obstacle course
- Dance movements to songs
- Exercises for young children

Classroom Staffing

All classrooms will have one teacher and a teacher aide at ALL times. 3K will have up to 15 students per class. Pre-K 4 will have up to 18 students per class. Each classroom teacher holds an Early Childhood NY State Certification, a Bachelor's/Master's Degree in Education and meets the criteria put forth by the NYCDOE.

Toileting

Pre-k and 3K students have their own dedicated bathroom. Toileting skills are helpful but not required before the start of school. Staff will assist children with toileting, handwashing and other critical self -care routines. Each 3k for all classrooms is equipped with a changing station. The school and parents will work together to help students develop skills to use the bathroom independently. If your child is not potty- trained we ask that families provide diapers/ pull ups.

Nap/Rest

All children who attend the program have a rest period in the afternoon. Children are assigned a rest mat for the school year. Families send in a freshly laundered blanket and sheet each Monday. The sheet and blanket are sent home each Friday to be washed.

Attendance

It is important that students attend school every day and arrive on time. Regular attendance is necessary in order for each child to receive the most benefit from the Pre-K/3K experience. Going to school regularly and being on time are important factors in the attitude your child will develop about school. A positive attitude about school and regular attendance will pay off in the years to come. When children

arrive at school on time, they have a better educational and social experience in Pre-K/3K. If your child is sick, please email the child's teacher. When your child is able to return, send a note with the child to explain the absence. Please keep your child's teacher informed of any illness or emergency.

Arrival and Departure

All children MUST be escorted into and out of their classroom at all times. All children must be signed in and out of the classroom daily. It is important that your child be in the classroom on time so that he/she can be properly greeted by the teachers. The first ten minutes of each session are reserved for this essential interaction. If you have a minor question, you may briefly speak to the teacher at this time. If you have any concerns about your child that will require a lengthier conversation, please feel free to make an appointment for a conference. Please keep in mind that our teachers must give their full attention to the many children in their classes. Warmly greeting each child is a key part of a positive experience and all children deserve the full attention of their teachers.

Escort Policy

If a person, other than a parent, is picking a child up, the parent must have listed this person on the emergency contact card or have written a note to the teacher in advance, noting the name of the person. No child will be released to an unauthorized escort. Pick up person MUST show a photo ID. Please make sure the picture ID matches the information on the emergency card.

Meals:

Children eat morning snacks, lunch and afternoon snacks each day. The nutritious meals and snacks are provided by an outside food vendor. Menus will be provided to families and parents always have the option to send lunch. Kindly remember that we are a NUT FREE school.

Allergy Alert

YOU MUST alert your child's teacher of any allergies in person and on the form given at Orientation. Each classroom has an ALLERGY ALERT. This informs all staff of the child's allergy.

Emergency Closings:

If we need to close the school due to harsh weather conditions, storms or snow, you will be emailed. Please check your email.

Fire Drills and Evacuations

In the unlikely event that such an occurrence will happen, we are prepared. The children will learn how to evacuate the building as it will be practiced over the school year as is required. It will be done in a very calm and orderly fashion and a record is set of each drill.

School Nurse

A full-time school Nurse is available to the children at all times. If your child becomes ill while at school, they will be brought to the school Nurse and parents will be notified. It is school policy for all accidents/injuries that occur at school be reported to the school Nurse and parents informed. A report will be sent home with your child indicating what the school Nurse observed, what was done to address the situation, and what follow-up is recommended.

Communication

Communication between Home and School is very important. The school will send notices home to you by placing those

notes in the folder in your child's backpack or schoolbag. Please check your child's folder every night. Please respond and send notes back to us by placing it in your child's folder. We will also send art projects and work home in your child's folder. If there is a matter that needs to be discussed, please contact me or the teacher and we will set up an appointment if necessary. Our doors are always open and we want to work together for the good of the children. When home and school work together, great gains are made!
